### SUMMER NEWSLETTER

The dowsers first trip this season was on 3<sup>rd</sup> May and I think one could say it didn't go quite according to plan. However, we had an enjoyable time as recorded below by Sue Watts-Cutler:

The sunny morning of May 3rd saw a group of SH dowsers gathering at the entrance to the lane leading to Goodrich Castle, the destination of the day's field trip. However, there turned out to be a slight hiccup: overnight, the castle had had a break in and the custodians had closed it to the public and were awaiting the police.

Although this initially seemed rather a blow, some creative discussions and a kind offer from Ros soon produced a perfect nearby alternative – Ros's own garden and paddock...........

Ros has often talked about the energetic features to be found on her land but it all came alive when the members were actually there to dowse it for themselves. There are spirals a-plenty, a rare high frequency energy line connecting nearby sacred sites via her garden and plenty of archaeology. In fact the latter appears to stretch from around 2000 B.C. right up into recent times and includes in the paddock the site of a stone age cloistered round temple/shrine whose walls were several feet thick, and a small Roman road with contemporary British round hut beside it. The undulations of open cast mining can be seen at the front of the house, whilst up in the woods at the back is the site of another ancient circular site – one of those connected by the high frequency energy line.

The day was crowned by an ad-hoc lunch, hastily gathered from Goodrich village post office and Ros's own kitchen cupboards, and there was also the opportunity to walk around Ros's beautiful garden which she has lovingly and artistically nurtured and landscaped for over twenty years. A grand day out indeed!
